The department	3 consultants with special interests in asthma, TB, and lung cancer. All respiratory pathology represented but limited facilities mean patients with conditions such as pulmonary hypertension or requiring treatment such as home BiPAP are referred to other hospitals.
The type of work to expect and learning opportunities	Both FY1 doctors are permanently based on the respiratory ward and look after both respiratory and general medical patients. The work comprises the usual spectrum of FY1 duties, such as ward rounds, practical procedures, x-ray meetings and ward-based patient care.
	There are opportunities to perform respiratory-specific procedures, ranging from bedside spirometry to thoracocentesis and chest drain insertion.
	There are 3 <sup>rd</sup> and 5 <sup>th</sup> year medical students attached to the department, providing opportunities to be involved in medical education.

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Placement	F1 Trauma and Orthopaedics
The department	Comprises 6 consultants, a similar number of SpRs (mostly non-training posts) and 3 FY1s. It is a busy department which receives a lot of non-traumatic cases (trauma goes to the Royal London). Many # NOFs, usually elderly with multiple medical comorbidities.
The type of work to expect and learning opportunities	Significant proportion of time will be devoted to service provision. Being present on multiple ward rounds for different teams throughout the day and then dealing with the work that arises from that. A Friday morning meeting provides limited teaching and educational opportunity. Occasionally the opportunity to be taught joint aspiration or a similar procedure may arise. When there is time it is possible to go to theatre (rare-never). The Homerton operates a joint orthogeriatrics service under the orthopaedic and COE physicians. Anyone with a fracture who is over 65 requires a full geriatric work-up, which is facilitated by the house officer.

Clinical Supervisor(s) for the placement	Any of the Trauma and Orthopaedic consultants.
Main duties of the placement	Ward rounds, orthogeriatric assessment, liaising with medics/ITU when your patients get sick.
Typical working pattern in this placement	Start at around 07:30 with the morning X-ray meeting and then discuss the new patients admitted overnight. Post take ward round in the morning then jobs. Whilst doing jobs, try to chase down SpRs from various teams to do a ward round of that consultant's patients, do the jobs created from those ward rounds.  Also part of the general surgical on call rota, do late shifts 1-9pm, and weekends 8-8.

The department	Upper GI surgery. Comprises 4 upper GI consultants, one specialist in Bariatric surgery, 4 registrars and 3 FY1s (two in training and one locum). The department specialises in elective Bariatric surgery and acute general surgical problems.

The department	Two surgical wards, team of two consultants, 2 registrars, 1CT.
The type of work to expect and learning opportunities	Ward-based with opportunities to go to theatre and attend clinics to clerk new patients and discuss with consultant.
Where the placement is based	Homerton University Hospital, Thomas Audley and Priestley wards
Clinical Supervisor(s) for the placement	Dr H Pardoe
Main duties of the placement	Responsible for patient care, working with nursing staff, therapists, and other healthcare professionals. Following ward rounds to ensure patient care delivered, for example ordering urgent investigations from x-rays to CT scans and administering contrast. Fluid, pain, antibiotics, DVT prophylaxis management with appropriate agencies. Discharges +++. Common discussions with microbiology, pain management, dieticians, palliative care, and medical teams. Attend department meetings/audit meetings. First on call with ill surgical patients developing during the day away from seniors.
Typical working pattern in this placement	Normal week/2x weeks of lates/ 2x weekends (with 12 days straight) 7:30-17:30/18 daily with half days. Monday lunch: lower GI audit meeting Friday morning: lower GI surgery MDT 7:30 prompt ward rounds until about 8:30, then do required jobs/referrals/discharges
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Placement	F1 Surgery (Breast/Urology)
The department	The post involves working for 2 different teams. There are 2 breast Consultants and 3 urology consultants. The breast team also covers general surgery so there are a wide range of operations performed and we also do general surgery on call. Although the FY1 is not oncall with the team, it is their responsibility to do the post-take ward round with the breast consultant.
The type of work to expect and learning opportunities	As you cover two teams the range of patient conditions at any one time can be quite diverse. There is the opportunity to practice practical procedures in urology whilst being able to gain more general clinical experience under the breast/general surgery team. This post enables one to develop skills such as time management, organization, and communication skills as one must juggle two teams simultaneously.

Main duties of the placement	The F1 doctor is responsible with other staff for the ward care of patients and the maintenance of the patient's medical record. The F1 is also responsible for collecting preparing and presenting the data at the monthly general surgery Morbidity & Mortality meetings. They are expected to attend the structured teaching programmes provided by the department. The doctor will be responsible for such other specific clinical duties as allocated by consultants including performing other duties in occasional emergencies and unforeseen circumstances.

The department	The department comprises 3 consultant rheumatologists 2 of whom share the ward duties, 1 SPR, 1 SHO and 2 F1s
The type of work to expect and learning opportunities	Ward based 9-5. Taking care of all patients under the rheumatology team. Average 7-14 patients. Although the consultants are rheumatologists, most of the inpatient work is general medicine. This allows a good exposure to a wide range of presenting complaints and illnesses.  The overall educational objectives of the F1 year are to provide the trainee with the knowledge, skills and

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Placement	F1 Pharmacology
The department	The department comprises of one consultant, Dr. L. Abrams, half a registrar (registrar shared between Dr. Abrams and the Care of the Elderly team), one SHO and an FY1. Even though this post is advertised as 'Pharmacology', there is not much pharmacology involved. Instead, this is more of a general medicine rotation. The registrar and SHO have to do some weeks in Acute Care, during which time they will not be available to help with ward duties/concerns. Dr. Abrams' does OP hypertension clinics and the FY1 can choose to go to some of these clinics if there is ward cover, or not much work on the ward.  There are also medical students who from part of the team. 4-6 3 <sup>rd</sup> year medical students, and 1 final year student.
The type of work to expect and learning opportunities	The type of work that is expected from an FY1 is the same as that for any general medical rotation. The FY1 is required to attend all ward rounds and keep track of procedures/results for individual patients. They are also required to book tests/investigations or make appropriate referrals to other departments as advised by the consultant/Reg/SHO. On Monday (alternate week), Wednesday and Friday the FY1 will do the ward round with the SHO. If the SHO is on Acute Care, then the FY1 will have to do ward rounds by themselves. Any concerns can be relayed to the registrar or consultant via bleep.
	There are a number of learning opportunities. Cases that the team is likely to manage are Neuropenic sepsis, cellulitis, pyelonephritis, UTI, chest pain, heart failure, D&V, alcohol detox, overdose, headache. Dr. Abrams' is a Hypertension consultant and clinical pharmacologist; therefore, there are several opportunities to learn about these topics.
	Procedures such as ABG, venipuncture, cannulation, catheterisation are all possible on this rotation.

The department	4 months Psychiatry rotations with 4 one-week blocks on ACU.
	FY1 post in Psychiatry is based at the Homerton Hospital, as well as 11 Core and 8 Speciality Trainees in Psychiatry. Additional core and higher trainees in child and adolescent psychiatry are based at the CAMHS site.
The type of work to expect and learning opportunities	The learning opportunities include knowledge and skills in psychiatric assessment, the management and treatment of common psychiatric conditions and the management of severe psychiatric conditions and comorbid substance misuse. All the trainees work with a highly structured, carefully chosen and well-defined caseload.
Where the placement is based	The Homerton Hospital and in the City &Hackney CAMHS team, based in an adjacent building to the hospital in Homerton Row.
Clinical Supervisor(s) for the placement	Dr Fisher, General Adult Psychiatrist, Dr Evans General Adult and Rehabilitation Psychiatrist and Dr Sharon Davies, Consultant Child and Adolescent Psychiatrist
Main duties of the placement	The FY1 Trainees are expected to deliver daily care to patients under their team. The department	The elderly care unit has 56 beds, caring for patients with acute illness as well as providing a rehabilitation service.
The type of work to expect and learning opportunities	Daily ward rounds (sometimes solo and sometimes with senior support) with twice weekly consultant rounds. Jobs including bloods, cannulas and ordering/chasing investigations. Liaising with relatives and allied health professionals is a significant proportion of the workload. There are also twice weekly MDT meetings to attend and scribe.
	There is a multitude of MDT work and communication skill testing with the elderly patients as well as opportunities for basic ward practical procedures.
Where the placement is based	You will work on the Elderly Care Unit at Homerton University Hospital.
Clinical Supervisor(s) for the placement	There is good senior support in the registrars and consultants, and one of the latter will be your clinical supervisor.
Main duties of the placement	Ward rounds, maintain notes, prescribing, reviewing patients – routine (mostly) and acutely unwell (sometimes). Mainly ward-based work. Liaise with GPs, other hospitals, care-homes. Liaise with social workers, OTs and PTs to discharge patient with suitable levels of support given their ability to cope with ADLs. Bloods, cannulas, TTA's.

The type of work to expect and learning opportunities	All F1 Doctors in hospital posts will generally be ward based during the 'normal' working day and expected to deliver the daily medical care of all the patients on their ward irrespective of specialty. Clinical Supervisor(s) for the placement	You may be assigned to any of the four consultants in the department. It is normally whoever is covering the wards when you start your placement.
Main duties of the placement	The F1 doctor is responsible with other staff for the ward care of patients and the maintenance of the patient's medical record. They are expected to attend MDT and educational meetings relevant to the department. These include Tuesday morning Upper GI MDT and Friday morning Lower GI MDT. It is also the responsibility of the F1 doctors to clerk in and discharge patients coming to the Medical Day Unit for liver biopsies. This is normally on a Monday and Thursday.



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Typical working pattern in this placement	The hours are 0900 to 1700 with exceptions. These exceptions include: On Mondays ward rounds may start at 0900 and so preparation needs to be carried out earlier. On Tuesdays MDT is at 0830. The department	East London Foundation Trust has a long and well established history of foundation doctor placements. The City and Hackney CAMHS team (Community and Adolescent Mental Health Service) is based in the adjacent building to the Homerton Hospital in Homerton Row. There is currently an FY1 in CAMHS and 2 FY1s and an FY2 based in the hospital as well as 11 Core and 8 Specialty Trainees
The type of work to expect and learning opportunities	Good working hours. Typically 9-5 daily. Trainees will attend the psychiatry induction, receive 1 hour of clinical supervision per week and be released to attend 1 day per month generic FY2 teaching at the Homerton University Hospital Foundation Trust.
Where the placement is based	The City and Hackney CAMHS team is based in the adjacent building to the Homerton Hospital in Homerton Row.
Clinical Supervisor(s) for the placement	Drs Davies, Eriksen and Stewart
Main duties of the placement	The trainee will be based at a community child and adolescent mental health out-patient service, based in premises adjacent to Homerton Hospital. They will gain experience in the assessment and treatment of a wide range of child and adolescent mental health disorders, including emotional and behavioural problems, neurodevelopmental disorders and adolescent mental illnesses, working as part of a skilled and experienced multi-disciplinary team. The trainee will experience presentations at the Homerton Hospital in A&E and on the paediatric ward, as well as within a range of community settings
Typical working pattern in this placement	9am-5pm most days.
Employer information	The employer for this post is Homerton University Hospital NHS Foundation Trust. Homerton provides acute and community services for Hackney, the City and the surrounding communities and a bespoke range of specialist services for a wider population. The Trust main site is Homerton Hospital. On 1 April 2011, community health services serving Hackney and the City (CHS) transferred to the management of Homerton. This was a hugely important development for the Trust, which is now the major provider of both hospital and community services for the people of
